6. Distance education/online education:	The outbreak of Covid-19 greatly affected the overall teaching learning process during the year. In such conditions our faculty members continued the teaching learning process through the online platforms like Google Classrooms, Google Meet, Zoom, and YouTube to complete the syllabi. They tried to keep contact with the students and help them to remain psychologically and emotionally stable when the whole world was threatened by havoc of the virus. The internal evaluation was conducted by the college through online mode by using Google forms. Even though the completely new online evaluation method posed many challenges for under graduate students in rural area. During the unlock phases of lockdown we take efforts for the blended learning.

In today's world of knowledge explosion, Information technology, Artificial Intelligence, Chat GPT and Internet revolution, teaching and learning process has to be made interesting by adopting various methods of learning.

To enhance students learning experiences more effectively, we boost student-centric methods to deliver the curriculum.

1. Experiential teaching-learning:

This method include visits, study tours, excursions were organized for students. So that they get hand-on experience of what they learn in the classroom, this helps to experiential learning.

Guest lectures by eminent speakers are arranged, workshops are organized to supplement teaching.

2. Participative learning:

This is the best student-centric learning method, in which students actively participate. Assignments are given to students for emphasis on self-study.

Beside teaching, college provides high importance to personality development of students through extra-curricular, curricular and skill based activities. The objective of these student centered activities is to involve students as much as possible in learning procedures. In order to teach human values, ethics and social responsibility, students are encouraged to participate in these activities. These activities creating a safe space to relax, interact, collaborate, think out of the box, and enhance their talents and leadership capabilities.

Seminars, various competitions (essay, story telling, elocutions, debating) and poster presentations are organized by SDD, Career Katta & NSS to improve their skills as well as knowledge on the topic.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent:

As per the guidelines and CBCS Patterns of the university, the college implements 60- 40 patterns for the evaluation of the students. 60 marks are allocated for external evaluation and 40 marks for internal evaluation. The classification of these 40 marks is divided into different heads such as attendance & behavior, two tests and home assignments. In order to make the examination more transparent and objective of all the departments, the college examination committee conducts the examination with a centralized schedule. That schedule is displayed on the college notice board to aware the students timely. The assessment report is discussed with the students and doubts or queries, if any, are solved to the satisfaction of the students.

While evaluating the performance at all levels, teachers are flexible and appreciative towards the students. The result is also discussed with the department Heads and Principal to initiate corrective measures in future. During the LOCKDOWN period from Mar 2020 to Jan 2022, in accordance with UGC, State Government and University regulations, the college has conducted online examinations through Google Classroom, Google form or other system.

The grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient:

Grievances related to internal assessment: There is complete transparency in the internal assessment. Academic calendar for internal examination is prepared by IQAC. College Examination Committee monitors internal evaluation process. The student's grievances related to internal examination are solved by College examination committee. A handwritten application is to be submitted by the student or orally grievance to the examination department explaining their grievance. The examination committee going through the application and forward it to the Principal. The Principal in consultation with committee, solve the grievance and make the remark on the application which then comes back to the examination department. After taking necessary steps, students are informed. The process is completely transparent.

Pre-examination grievances: The grievances related to problem in submission of examination forms and queries related to mistakes in hall tickets, regarding name, course name and subject change are resolved promptly by the examination committee by communicating with Principal.

Post-examination grievances: If grievance is related to revaluation of marks, examination committee will guide the student to fill revaluation form available on University website. If student is not satisfied by revaluation he can apply for photo copy of answer sheet. Student will get photo copy of answer sheet of the concerned paper immediately on his email. After assessing the answer sheets with respective subject teacher, student can apply for verification and revaluation of answer sheet. The result of revaluation is given by the university within 15 days.

4. Under guidance of Prof. Dr. B. C. More 03 Students completed their Ph.D. degree.
5. Dr. S. S. Maske is recognized PG teacher and research guide in Marathi; one student completed Ph.D. under his guidance. He uses to write regular articles on social issues.
6. Prof. L. J. Gawali performing one act play (Gav Gada) in the periphery of Dhule district to create

social awareness.

7. Our faculties have been published 78 research papers and 42 books / chapters in this assessment period. Three faculties are promoted as a Professor and two Associate Professors by CAS.

12. Department of Chemistry creating environment among the students regarding the importance of Chemistry in day-to-day life and inspiring students to participate in University level CAT (Chemistry ability test).
13. Dr. Y. M. Nandre completed Diploma of Yoga teacher from YCMOU, Nasik (M.S). Prof. K. D. Kadam and Prof. Y. M. Nadre are qualified Yoga instructor under skill India. Prof. Nandre has done his Ph. D. in Yogic Science. He has conducted special camps for female subjects to solve the problem of menstrual cycle in our institute, preparing students for Avishkar, guiding students for Yogic dance. He involved in organizing & conducting International Yoga Day & regular Yoga Camps for Senior Citizens.

Best Practice: 1.Tree Plantation and Conservation

Goal:

A remarkable feature of the college is tree plantation and conservation.

The object of conducting the best practice tree plantation and conservation in college premises For beautification of campus,

- For healthy atmosphere,
- To create Oxygen Bar
- To control noise and air pollution,
- To increase biodiversity,
- To make premises eco-friendly.

The Context:

The survival of human being depends mainly on the survival of trees and forest. Trees are helping us in immensely important ways. Trees plays significant role in maintain equilibrium of the environment, many ecological process. Besides trees have social, spiritual and medical significant work.

According to national forest policy forest cover should be 33 of the total land but in India it is nearly about 24. Tree plantation and conservation is the best solution to fight against the global warming. To achieve the goal, our institute initiated this activity from July 2018. Plants have important role in climate change. The deforestation contributes to global warming phenomenon through the rise in the level of CO₂. Tree plantation drive can help to reduce the concentration of this problem by removing CO₂ from the atmosphere. Trees reduce the heat through the evaporation cooling and reducing the amount of

sunlight that reaches the Earth. We hope it might be helpful to solve the problem of global warming up to certain extent. Many efforts have been taken by Government of Maharashtra through social forest department, some NGO,s and all educational institutes through NSS NCC.

The practice:

We have selected one acre of barren land adjacent to the college campus. First we built fencing wall for protection and clean the area then under the guidance of principal, our college students dug 80 pits for tree plantation at certain distance of suitable size. We brought humus soil and manure from outside. The pits dug by students were filled by this humus soil and manure. For plantation we brought sapling of trees of Neem, Pipal, Banyan, Gulmohar, Amla etc. from Social Forest Nursery- Pankheda. Tree plantation programme was organized on 16th July 2018 in presence of College Management Council, Principal, Staff and students. For protection and care one non-teaching member Mr. Tarachand Chaure was appointed by principal.

During the last three years college has planted different varieties of plants species at different intervals in the campus with the help of staff and students (NCC and NSS).Present green campus is the outcome of our sincere efforts under the guidance of Principal

All staff members create environment awareness among the students in the campus to propagate green campaign successfully.

Evidences of success:

All the sapling trees were grown and survived successfully and attended average height of 6 feet's. The entire land of this area is covered by herbs, shrubs and bushes. Increased biodiversity was observed. Our students are taking efforts for survival of plants Mostly our non- teaching member Mr. Tarachand Chaure is taking more efforts by regular watering the plants and regular care vigilance of plants.

The green campus developed by college /Institute helps not only to save environment but also add beauty of campus, besides providing shade to our students and also used for scientific studies. College campus is enriched with varieties plant species. Eco campus strongly employed resulted in one of the beautiful and clean campus in the vicinity it has resulted in attracting students. The local peoples /stakeholders seeing this appreciated and thanked them for taking such great initiatives. These campus pictures were also spread in social media to give valuable message to society. Students became aware about importance of plants and familiar with the campus and various plants.

Problems encountered and resources required:

Initially land is rocky and impervious. That causes difficulty in digging the pits. Therefore we dug some pits by using JCB machine. In summer we face scarcity of water but Mr. Tarachand Chaure was managing it.

In summer season we have to face lot of water scarcity. Hence in order to meet requirement we need to Gram panchyat supply of water. We have also therefore implemented drip irrigation system for the effective use of water.

Best Practice: 2. Vermiculture

Goal:

For research motivation short projects on vermiculture are given to the under graduate students for sustainable development.

Context:

Department of zoology involved in conduction of on vermiculture projects. The main aim objectives are to create responsibilities about the use of organic biofertilizer, pollution control, and organic refused recycling sustainable development. Project are given to those students they are especially has agricultural or farming background. Students involved utilizing organic refuse for the production of vermicompost thereby enhancing the scope of vermiculture technology.

The Practice:

Most of the students of our college are from weaker section or farmer society. So the college department of zoology come out with unique activity for the production of vermicompost. The students get skill to handle earthworm, to collect agricultural refuse some chemical analysis.

Evidence of success:

First second year undergraduate students are coming in the department asking about this activity. Some students taking worms trying at home to multiply by using kitchen garden waste some students bring their parents to understand this activity.

Obtaining biofertilizer or vermicast, that is used in college campus as manure and some fertilizers can be sold to the staff members. The prepared biofertilizers is distributed among the farmers and nurseries of the adjacent area free of cost.

Problems encountered:

At first it is difficult to find an adequate space for vermiculture, it is only restricted around the zoology laboratory. The limited infrastructure facility causes hindrance to expand this activity.

Notes:

This practice is eco-friendly can develop skill about the organic recycling. Vermicomposting is useful for sustainable development. Students can find financial source also.
